

# Michigan gets edge

### Wolverines 1-point favorites over hurting Hawks

Hayden Fry sounded like he had just met his Waterloo, when in fact he had only been to Wisconsin.

"I'm very concerned about our football team," Fry said Sunday, and he wasn't referring to top-ranked Iowa's inability to put away the Badgers in Saturday's 23-13 victory. "We're pretty well beaten up right now."

• An offensive guard, Kelly O'Brien, who may be out for the season after an opposing player fell on his leg;

• A tight end, Dave Murphy, who will likely undergo a knee operation and miss the rest of the season;

• A defensive tackle, Jeff Drost, who will be out who knows how long with a bad ankle; • And, the coach said, he had a little heartache himself. "There's one truly bad aspect of college football and that's that these guys I love and care for get beaten up and crippled," said Fry. "I'm concerned about them and that affects my personality." Fry didn't manage as much as a chuck-

le during his 20-minute teleconference, but then he hasn't had a chance to laugh for two weeks now and doesn't expect to until his team hits Evanston, Ill., Oct. 26 to play Northwestern. ST. LOUIS - Tommy Lasorda was fresh from watching his Los Angeles team destroyed 12-2 Sunday night by St. Louis, and he had a question for Whitey Herzog. "I'd like to ask Whitey if he thinks UI'S Norvell Whitey Herzog. we're still living in crap," Lasorda said. 



# finds coming home twice as nice

MADISON, Wis. - When Jay Norvell first became a Hawkeye, he found himself playing behind all-Big Ten strong safety Bobby Stoops.

Then, for two seasons, he backed up Mike Stoops, who earned all-conference honors both years.

Twice in those years Norvell, a 22-yearold native of Madison, suited up to play against Wisconsin in Camp Randall Stadium.

Twice Norvell never played a down. Saturday, Norvell was twice the player he had ever been, making two interceptions to set up both of Iowa's touchdowns as the Hawkeyes beat Wisconsin, 23-13.

"It was the best game I've ever played in my life," said Norvell, a former allstate defensive back at Madison Memorial High School. "I just had to wait my turn."

And once he got it, Norvell provided the Hawkeyes with turning points in both the

first and second halves. His first interception came in the second quarter at the Badgers' 28-yard line. Three plays later, Chuck Long passed eight yards for a touchdown to Bill Happel, giving Iowa a 10-0 lead.

In the fourth quarter, with Iowa leading just 13-10 and the Badgers' having scored on their previous two possessions, Norvell intercepted a pass by Bud Keyes at the Iowa 42-yard line and returned it to the Wisconsin 35. From there it took four

# Sure lowd won, but who's smiling?

MADISON, Wis. - First of all, it's just like last week.

It matters not how you played the game, but whether you won or lost.

Iowa didn't look like the No. 1 football team in the nation Saturday at Camp Randall Stadium, but when the season is all over, when they are handing out championships and deciding what team goes to what bowl, they don't ask who you played or how you looked or how much you won by, they just look at the record.

So Iowa is 5-0 — the best

season-beginning record for an Iowa football team in a quarter of a century - has won seven games in a row over a span of two seasons and is perhaps still a shaky No. 1 in some of the football polls.

Sentiment aside, though, I'd have to rate Michigan, for one, ahead of Iowa. Not only did Michigan play a much tougher non-conference schedule than Iowa, but the teams have played two common Big Ten foes and all the statistics and all the scores are heavily in Michigan's favor.

If Iowa's offense saved the day a week

ago against Michigan State when the defense couldn't solve the Spartan cutbacks, the defense certainly saved the day Saturday at Wisconsin.

The game certainly might have been lost, but the defense time and time again rose up to choke the Badgers just when it seemed an upset might be in the making. Three times Iowa stopped the Badgers when it was third-and-two, or less. Just after the half, with Iowa ahead only 10-7, the Badgers intercepted a Chuck Long pass at the Iowa 41. # Dorsett joins elite group

Tony Dorsett rated only two things better than joining the National Football League's elite 10,000-yard rushing club against the Pittsburgh Steelers: winning the Heisman Trophy and owning a Super Bowl ring.

The Dallas Cowboy running back said that becoming the NFL's sixth 10,000-yard rusher was made even sweeter because it accompanied a 27-3 victory over the Steelers, a team he idolized as a kid.

"This was one of the biggest highlights," Dorsett said. "Some said I'd never last. But

here I am."

Dorsett had his first 100-yard rushing day in five games against the Steelers and was on a winning team against them for the first time.

Dorsett now has 10,082 career yards. Going into Sunday, the all-time leaders were Walter Payton with 13,599, Jim Brown with 12,312, Franco Harris with 12,120, O.J. Simpson with 11,236 and John Riggins with 10,967.



### Tarp keeps Coleman off the base paths

ST. LOUIS — What the National League has been unable to do all summer — stop Vince Coleman on the basepaths — a 15-second freak accident did Sunday night, at least for a little while.

A little more than two hours before Game 4 of the National League playoffs, Coleman was partially run over by the Busch Stadium automatic tarp device as the tarp was hurriedly being put on the field.

The tarp and metal roll, 180 feet long, weighs about 1,200 pounds, but Coleman escaped with only a badly scrapped left leg and a ton of pain. He did not play Sunday night.

"I think he could (play in Game 5 today)," said Cardinals team doctor Stan London. "If everything checks out tomorrow like it did today, it'll be contingent on how much discomfort he's hav-

At 4:12 p.m., the rain started falling in St. Louis while the Cardinals were taking batting practice. What happened in the next five minutes or so was Grade A bad luck followed by textbook chaos.

The tarp came out of the ground, and was activated by a St. Louis grounds crew member standing in right field.

Down near home plate, Coleman was standing facing the tarp, only about a foot or so away. He had tossed his glove to Cardinal coach Dave Ricketts, and was looking off to the right to get somebody to get his bat.

Dodger batboy Howard Hughett can take it from there, because he saw it.

"The tarp started moving and he didn't seem to see it. It caught his left toe. He put his right foot out and tried to pull away, but it was too late. It had him. It went up to about his knee.'

Coleman shouted out "Hey, hey!" and then went down. Cardinal players rushed to help lift the tarp off of him, which had been stopped by the grounds crew. The tarp was on Coleman for about 15 seconds.

disastrous. The crowd was on fire and so were the Badgers, but good coverage and a strong rush helped Bud Keyes to throw three successive interceptions and no damage was done.

Later, with Iowa ahead only 13-7, the Badgers had a first-and-goal at the Iowa eight and wound up settling for a field goal. And still later, with Iowa ahead 20-10, but with the game still in doubt, the Badgers had a first-and-goal at the Iowa four and again had to settle for a field goal.

So hats off to the defense, and hats off to Rob Houghtlin, who earned his scholarship with three field goals in as many tries, the last one coming under considerable pressure with Iowa protecting a seven-point lead with 3:14 to go.

If the defense was good Saturday, holding Wisconsin to a single touchdown after several times being placed in jeopardy, the offense, for this team at least, was not up to snuff. Any time this team scores just two touchdowns, that's either a helluva defense it faced, or else it didn't execute very well. I would suspect the latter, although Wisconsin played very hard and with the expected great enthusiasm. Iowa simply wasn't able to sustain much Saturday. Although there were some bright plays here and there, especially the running of Ronnie Harmon, there wasn't much consistency on offense. There was always a penalty or a bad play or a pass a bit overthrown. The two touchdown marches totaled only 30 and 35 yards. For the day,

Iowa succeeded on only a very poor 3-of-13 third down plays.

To start the second half, when Iowa needed to take the ball and move it to regain the momentum, it failed to make even one first down on its first three

possessions. In fact, Iowa made only five first downs in the second half. Hand it to Wisconsin that Chuck Long's longest pass was for only 24 yards, and that a beautiful scrambling throw to David Hudson on his last completion of the day. And hand it to the Badgers that Long threw for only 167 yards, considerably below average for him.

Although Harmon had a truly great day, I wouldn't call Iowa running game impressive. Not the way we've seen some of Hayden's teams run in the past. When they wanted to, or needed to, they've been able to take the ball and march 75 yards and eat up seven minutes. This team hasn't yet shown that ability. But then we had Eddie Phillips and Norm Granger, or Eddie Phillips and Owen Gill, or Owen Gill and Ronnie Harmon. Now we've got Ronnie Harmon as the runner. Maybe this week somebody will blossom from the fullback spot carrying the ball. Maybe not.

four. I thought the Hawks would be good enough just to power it in from there with Harmon and/or Bush. But an option keeper by Long was well covered, a pass failed, a probable pass didn't open up and Long was tackled for a loss, and Mark Vlasic's fake field goal pass attempt was thrown a bit long. Later, of course, Robert Smith's near-disastrous drop of a punt forced more worrisome moments that shouldn't have been.

Iowa also has the problem of kickoffs right now, presumably because of Rob Houghtlin's sore leg. And that's ironic, because the coaching staff worked so hard this fall on all phases of the kicking game. That averages out to be the 35-yard line and surrendering that kind of field position can kill you against a team like Michigan. Well, the Hawks don't need to

COLLEGE FOOTBALL: It's shades of 1983 for Iowa State. Two years ago the Cyclones were embarrassed in a loss to a Missouri Valley Conference school, New Mexico State, but bounced back to beat Kansas 38-35 in its Big Eight opener the following week. Saturday, history repeated. ISU opened its Big 8 season with a 22-21 victory over Kansas, one week after being humbled by another Missouri Valley school, Drake. The Cyclones had been 16-point underdogs.

AMATEUR WRESTLING: Olympic champion Mark Shultz of the United States Saturday lived up to expectations and won a gold medal, but the Soviet Union dominated the World Freestyle Wrestling Championships on the first day, winning three of five events. Shultz downed Alexander Nanev of Bulgaria in the 180.5-pound (82 kilos) division. It was the first world title for Shultz, who beat the Bulgarian 10-5, and the 12th gold medal for the U.S. in the history of world wrestling title competition.

GOLF: Lanny Wadkins equaled the course record of 9-underpar 63 Sunday to overcome a 5-stroke deficit and win the \$400,000 Walt Disney World-Oldsmobile Classic golf tournament by two shots. Third-round leader Scott Hoch, who started the day five strokes up on Wadkins, saw his lead melt despite shooting a 3-under 69.

TENNIS: The top-seeded Czechoslovakian women's tennis team won one singles match from the United States and took the lead in the other singles Sunday before rain halted the Federation Cup finals. Czechoslovakia's Hana Mandlikova was leading 7-5, 3-0 when rain forced a halt in the second set of her match with American Kathy Jordan. The match will be resumed today.
