

Ohio St. Upsets No. 1 Iowa

Columbus, Ohio — Ohio State intercepted four Chuck Long passes and John Wooldridge raced 57 yards for a touchdown yesterday to spark the Buckeyes to a 22-13 upset of Iowa, ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press and United Press International polls. Ohio State is seventh in UPI and eight in AP.

The victory, before a record Ohio Stadium crowd of 90,467, moved Ohio State into a first-place tie in the Big Ten with the Hawkeyes. Both are 7-1 overall and 4-1 in the conference.

Ohio State, which ran its nation-leading home winning streak to 20 games, never trailed after Rich Spangler put the Buckeyes on top 3-0 with a 28-yard field goal early in the first quarter.

MIDWEST

A blocked punt by Sonny Gordon resulted in a safety and a 5-0 lead and Wooldridge's 57-yard burst up the middle made it 12-0. Wooldridge, subbing for the injured Keith Byars, broke free at the line of scrimmage and outraced Iowa's Nate Creer into the end zone. He ran nine times for 89 yards.

That long score came two plays after cornerback William White intercepted a Long pass and returned it to the Ohio State 38.

Spangler's second field goal, a 26-yarder, was set up by a pass interception by Greg Rogan, who returned to the Iowa 46.

Iowa, which entered the game averaging 40.3 points, scored its first touchdown on a third-quarter, 3-yard run by Ronnie Harmon of Bayside, who totaled 120 on 26 carries. But the Hawkeyes fumbled in the fourth quarter, and Ohio State scored in five plays for a 22-7 lead.

Illinois 3, Michigan 3

Champaign, Ill. — Chris White's 37-yard field-goal attempt for Illinois with four seconds left was partially blocked and bounced off the crossbar as Michigan (6-1-1) held on. Illinois (4-3-1) drove from inside its 10-yard line to set up White's attempt. The Illinois drive followed a fumble by Michigan fullback Gerald White deep in Illinois territory.

Quarterback Jack Trudeau led the late drive with four passes and two runs, one for a first down. Trudeau, who set an NCAA record for consecutive pass attempts without an interception, finished with 27 completions in 36 attempts for 230 yards. He ran his interception-free streak to 233 to pass the 198 set by Tulsa's Jerry Rhome in 1964.

Notre Dame 41, Navy 17

South Bend, Ind. — Allen Pinkett scored three touchdowns and set up another with a 43-yard run to lead Notre Dame (4-3) to its third straight win.

Pinkett carried 27 times for 161 yards. It was his 20th regular-season 100-yard game and his fourth in four years against the Midshipmen (3-5).

Napoleon McCallum scored for Navy in the first quarter and carried 24 times for 124 yards and finished the game with 205 all-purpose yards.

Oklahoma 48, Kansas 6

Norman, Okla. — Quarterback Jamelle Hollaway rushed for 162 yards and a touchdown to lead Oklahoma (5-1). Oklahoma trailed 3-0 early but

broke the game open with 20 straight second-quarter points. Kansas fell to 5-4.

Nebraska 41, Kansas State 3

Manhattan, Kan. — Tom Rathman and Paul Miles ran for two touchdowns apiece for Nebraska. The Cornhuskers (7-1) broke open a close game with 17 straight points in the second quarter. Kansas State fell to 1-7.

Wisconsin 31, Indiana 20

Madison, Wis. — Tailback Larry Emery rushed for 188 yards on 28 carries as Wisconsin snapped a four-game losing skid. Both teams are 4-4. Wisconsin's Todd Gregoire tied a school record with three field goals to give him 32 in his career. Gregoire's field goals were 22, 23 and again from 22 yards.

Oklahoma State 14, Colorado 11

Boulder, Colo. — Tailback Thurman Thomas rushed for 201 yards and two touchdowns to lift Oklahoma State (6-1). Thomas' scoring runs of 1 yard late in the second quarter and 60 yards early in the third quarter gave the Cowboys (5-3) a 14-3 lead in a rugged defensive struggle.

Michigan State 31, Minnesota 26

East Lansing, Mich. — Lorenzo White rushed for 172 yards and three first-half touchdowns for Michigan State. He rushed 49 times to become the leading single-season ball carrier in Michigan State history. The tailback has 1,244 yards on 289 carries. Eric Allen carried 259 times in 1971. The three TDs by White helped stake the Spartans (4-4) to a 31-10 halftime lead. Minnesota fell to (5-3).

Purdue 31, Northwestern 7

West Lafayette, Ind. — Quarterback Jim Everett passed for 292 yards and two touchdowns in 2½ quarters to lift Purdue (4-4). Northwestern fell to 3-5.

Missouri 28, Iowa State 27

Ames, Iowa — Darrell Wallace scored on a 1-yard run with 1:11 left and Warren Seitz followed with a two-point conversion pass to Herbert Johnson to give Missouri its first victory of the season. Iowa State is 3-5.

Missouri (1-7) rallied from a 24-14 halftime deficit to break a 10-game losing streak that dated back to last season, the longest in school history, and give first-year coach Woody Widenhofer the win.

Crawford Leads Army's Rout

West Point — At an institution where walking in a straight line usually is recommended, Tory Crawford's running style is incongruous. The 5-10, 170-pound sophomore quarterback from Houston, starting his third game for injured Rob Healy, zipped and zagged his way yesterday for 135 yards in 26 carries and two touchdowns to key a 34-12 win over Holy Cross (3-4-1) before 40,236 at Michie Stadium.

Asked about his unmilitary style, Crawford said: "When you go to school, you're a Cadet. When you get to the field, you're a football player. You try to keep everything in perspective."

Army (7-1), with hopes of a major bowl appearance, travels to Colorado Springs Saturday to face Air Force, which beat San Diego State yesterday for a 9-0 record. Representatives of 10 bowls, including the Fiesta, have at-

tended Army games.

"If we beat Air Force — as I think we will," Army athletic director Carl Ullrich said, "it'll open up a lot of doors for us. The Rose Bowl is locked in, but the Sugar, Cotton and Orange Bowls each have one spot open." Army ends its season with a home game against Memphis State on Nov. 16 and its traditional game against Navy Dec. 7 in Philadelphia.

It appeared as if Army might have been looking ahead to Air Force early in yesterday's game. Holy Cross took the opening kickoff and drove 74 yards, ending with Billy Young's 23-yard field goal. Early in the second quarter, Army failed on a fourth-and-one run at its own 33. Holy Cross moved into position for Young's 33-yard field goal and a 6-0 lead.

"They came out and took it to us," Army safety Doug Pavek said.

The Cadets moved 57 yards in 12 plays to score on Crawford's 6-yard keeper with 7:04 left in the first half. Crawford set up the score by gaining 14 yards on a third-and-11 at the Holy Cross 29. He ran to his left, reversed his field and circled right end.

Later in the second period, Army's Matt Bruckner blocked a punt by Dave Hock, which was recovered by Army's Leighton Drisdale at the Holy Cross 16. Six plays later, Doug Black scored from the 1 for a 14-6 lead.

Holy Cross did not quit. The first time the Crusaders got the ball in the second half, they drove 76 yards, scoring on Jeff Wiley's 7-yard pass to Gill Fenerty, who rushed for 128 yards and has 1,087 this season. But on a two-point conversion try, Wiley was sacked by defensive end Kurt Gutierrez.

Crawford carried six times for 28 yards and completed a 16-yard pass on

third-and-11 to Scott Spellmon in a 61-yard scoring drive. Crawford's 4-yard run capped the drive.

A few minutes later, Holy Cross' John Phelps was stopped on an unplanned faked-punt try by linebacker Chip England a yard shy of a first down at the Crusaders' 21. Six plays later, Black bulled over from the 1. Craig Stopa's PAT, his 52nd in a row and 96th in his career (a school record), made the score 28-12.

Pavek's two interceptions, at Army's 5- and 15-yard lines, respectively, stopped the Crusaders' last two drives. After the second, Holy Cross was penalized twice for a total of 30 yards. Army's Andy Peterson scored from 27 yards on the game's final play. Stopa wasn't allowed a fifth PAT because the crowd onto the field.

"Once we got rolling," Crawford said, "there was no stopping us."
