# Course Load For Harmon Is Key Topic

Chicago — Former University of Iowa running back Ronnie Harmon played football his senior year despite being on academic probation, the athletic department's academic counseling supervisor, Willie Fred Mims, testified in a Chicago U.S. District Court yesterday.

Harmon and Mims were the first two witnesses called to testify against sports agents Norby Walters, 58, and Lloyd Bloom, 29, on trial for multiple charges of racketeering, extortion, mail fraud and obstruction of justice. Prosecutors have charged that Walters and Bloom defrauded seven universities, including Iowa, of scholarship money by illegally signing athletes to representation contracts, in violation of NCAA eligibility rules.

Defense lawyers have been trying to portray Walters and Bloom as the victims of money-hungry college athletes who used the agents to set up deals with NFL teams, and then firing them to escape paying them commissions. They also want to show that although the agents may have signed and paid athletes in violation of NCAA rules — not a violation of criminal law — universities and players routinely skirted NCAA regulations as well.

Mims told jurors that Harmon was on academic probation his senior year with a 1.69 grade-point average, and that Harmon's academic adviser wrote on his official grade transcript that Harmon was "still not working toward degree." Nevertheless, Mims said the university certified him as eligible to play football his senior year.

According to Big Ten Conference requirements, a fourth-year student-athlete must have a 1.85 average and make continued progress towards attaining his degree. There are instances in which student-athletes on academic probation remain eligible to compete in college.

Tuesday, under cross-examination from defense attorney Dan K. Webb, Harmon admitted that he had played every game of Iowa's 1985 football season while on academic probation.

But Iowa football coach Hayden Fry denied outside of court that Harmon ever played football while academically ineligible. He said, "A lot of guys are on academic probation from semester to semester but they are still eligible. . . . It depends on what the cumulative [grade-point] total is; it depends on how much a 'D' would bring it down. It might still be enough to be eligible."

According to his grade transcript, Harmon received credit for courses in billiards, bowling, soccer and football in pursuit of his declared major, which until his senior year, was computer science. Yet by the end of his junior year, he had not taken a single course related to his major.

The summer following his junior year after he had been placed on academic probation, Harmon took a course entitled "Water Color Painting" to raise his grade average. He earned a "D" in the course.

Sometime during Harmon's senior year, Mims testified, Harmon switched his major to general studies. But, according to his grade transcript, Harmon never filed the document required for a switch in majors.

# Stony Brook Ousted

Newark — New Jersey Institute of Technology went on a 13-0 fourth-quarter run on its way to an 88-79 victory over Stony Brook last night in the semifinals of the ECAC Metro N.Y.-N.J. Division III basketball playoffs.

NJIT's Chris Miles, who scored 21 points, and Reggie James, who had 22, hit three-pointers during the 13-0 spurt, which began with eight minutes left and the game tied at 61. Larry D'Zio also had 22 points for NJIT (24-5).

Stony Brook, which finished its season at 16-12, was led by Steve Hayn with 22 points and Stan Martin with 16.

In the other division playoff semifinal, host Kean (N.J.) defeated NYU, 116-78.

### NY Tech Remains Hot

Curtis Dunn, who scored a game-high 26 points, hit a three-pointer with two seconds left in the first half to give New York Tech a 38-36 lead it never relinquished in an 86-80 victory over Queens College. Dunn was 4-for-7 from three-point range. Teammate Rick Bland collected 24 points and 21 rebounds.

The win — Tech's fifth straight and its 17th in its last 19 games — upped the Bears' record to 19-8 overall and 9-1 in the Big Apple Conference. Queens fell to 14-13 and 6-4.

In the opening round of the Big Apple playoffs, top-seeded Tech will face No. 4 Dowling at SUNY-Old Westbury tomorrow at 7:30 p.m.
